

ELIHU AND JOB'S RESPONSE

The third party – The mediator

- + Steps in the conversation
- × Rebukes Job for being righteous in his own eyes
 - + Blaming God for unjust treatment
 - + God speaks through pain
- Rebukes Job's friends they don't have the answers but keep condemning Job
 - + God can make a righteous man suffer
 - + Wicked cannot be hidden from God
- if righteous have acted defiantly, He seeks to bring them repentance by convincing them of their transgressions.

GOD'S INTERACTION WITH JOB AND FRIENDS

- × God shows the wonders of the inanimate creation
- Key God shows the wonders of the animate creation
- Key God shows the wonders in Behemoth (land)
- × Gods shows the wonders in Leviathan (ocean)
- × Job's response (Job 42:1-6)
- × Job's friends
 - + Seven bulls and seven rams as a burn offering
 - × Job served as the mediator

JOB'S BLESSING AND MORE

× Job is blessed again

× Job's suffering is physical and spiritual

- × Job's flaw is his self righteousness

 - + But your stance in the Lord
